Building-wide environmental program will benefit everyone



With global warming in the news every day and everyone talking about "going green," wouldn't it be wonderful if we could help the environment and boost the bottom line at work? Both goals are achievable as 311 South Wacker Drive introduces this summer an exciting new program called Greenergy™. Part of a major environmental initiative from CB Richard Ellis (CBRE), the building's management company, Greenergy launches with some simple steps everyone can take to conserve energy at little or no cost.

"Conserving electricity is one of the easiest and most effective places to start without compromising comfort or workplace efficiency," said Nancy Capadona, general manager of 311 South Wacker. "It can lead to lower operating costs for all of us. Just as important, it will make us even better citizens of the community and our planet.'

CBRE's 400 largest buildings - those over 100,000 square feet - are part of the program rollout. As the largest property under management in Chicago, 311 South Wacker will help lead the initiative, which is based on a program from Energy Star, the conservation and education organization of the Environmental Protection Agency. As experts in developing energy efficiency guidelines - you've probably seen their logo on appliances in your home - they are providing the training sessions and materials that our building has already begun using as staff learns to audit, benchmark and track our energy usage.

Our goal will be to reduce energy consumption by 10 percent. The building's ownership, management and staff will lead the way in this effort by keeping building equipment and systems in top shape to run most efficiently. Janitorial staff will be instructed to turn off unnecessary lighting when they leave a space. HVAC systems will be calibrated to run when they are needed most and less frequently during other periods.

For tenants, participation will be easy. 311's tenants pay directly for all the power they consume, except that which runs the HVAC systems. Taking a few simple steps can really add up and result in valuable savings that impact the bottom line. Energy Star estimates that a firm occupying a relatively large office space, for example, could potentially save thousands of dollars annually. Here are a few things you can do:

- Switch off lights and equipment before you go home at night, including computer monitors, printers, photocopiers, audiovisual equipment and coffee makers.
- On sunny days, forego using the lights in perimeter offices.
- Program all computers and monitors to go into low-power sleep mode when they go unused for a set period of time. Such a simple move can save \$25 to \$35 annually per PC, according to Energy Star.
- Adjust your thermostat by one or two degrees to conserve energy.

"Our tenants are key in making the building run efficiently," Ms. Capadona said. "Just do a few simple things and savings should be easy to achieve."

Energy conservation is the first step in CBRE and 311 South Wacker's Greenergy plan. Concurrently, our building has improved its recycling program (please see accompanying story). Further down the road, CBRE will encourage water conservation, the use of green building materials and other products, and more.

"We are excited to be incorporating green thinking into our building's operations," Ms. Capadona said. "Now is the time to play our part, and what better place to do it than in the workplace?"

what goes around comes around

Improved recycling program launches in May

Why be good when you can be great? As part of the Greenergy program, 311 South Wacker has revamped and expanded its waste recycling program. Now we need our tenants to help us reach some new goals.

311 South Wacker currently produces approximately 10 tons of recyclable paper, plastic and metal each week, but roughly 25 percent of that material -5,000 pounds - ends up in landfills because it is contaminated. To be great, we hope to cut this contamination rate in half by the end of 2007. And that's where you come in. First, there is paper recycling. Tenants are good at separating recyclable paper from wet trash, but the two still manage to mix. It is very important that everyone use the colored bag system that we provide for your office's waste receptacles. Clear bags (usually used in copy rooms and at individual desks) are for recyclable materials. Black bags (usually used in the kitchen areas) are for non-recyclable materials such as food and beverage waste. paper recycling dos & don'ts

Question: Should I put it in the paper recycling bin?

Building management is doing its part, too. To make sure that paper is not contaminated on the first-floor loading dock before it is hauled away, we had Allied Waste Services install a new trash compactor this spring to better handle wet waste.

Here's another way you can help: participate in 311's co-mingling program, which recycles plastic and aluminum. Simply put plastic bottles and other plastic packaging with the recycling codes one and two (found on the package

bottom framed in a triangle) in specially marked co-mingling containers. You can toss in aluminum, steel, tin and bi-metal cans, too. Please note that it is very important that you empty all bottle and cans first. To obtain co-mingling containers for your office space, call the office of the building (312/692-8200). Allied supplies them free of charge.

So where do all the recyclables go? Our plastic mostly goes into manufacturing wall-to-wall carpet, while our aluminum largely goes into new beer cans. As for paper, it is sold to paper manufacturers in the United States and China. According to Allied, they cannot buy enough to keep up with demand.

mailroom security tops agenda

Latest training looks at identifying odd packages

The security staff at 311 South Wacker is always looking for ways to make our building a safe and pleasant place in which to work. That care extends to mail services that involve staff in tenant mailrooms and the building's Messenger Center. In April, inspectors from the U.S. Postal Service conducted a training session to alert tenants' office managers, mailroom employees and the Messenger Center staff to security issues regarding the mail.

"Taking mail safety seriously is an important part of building security," said Bernard Payne, director of security. "When everybody is working together, and tenants are just as aware as we are, it makes everyone safer.'

The U.S. postal inspectors focused on how to identify suspicious packages and what to do upon finding one. Signs that a package should be treated with caution include excessive postage or tape, stained or torn wrapping, lots of misspellings in the address, a stamped "Urgent, Open Immediately" or something to that effect, or no return address.

Here's what tenants should do to keep the mail safe:

- 1. Create internal handling and emergency policies and procedures.
- 2. If a suspicious package is received, determine if there is a need to contact emergency personnel.
- 3. If so, isolate the area and call the U.S. Postal Inspection Service at 312/983-7900 or call 9-1-1.
- 4 Then call building security to let them know of the situation.

Park to blossom again this summer

311's beautiful landscaping has earned our building a prize for a third year in Mayor Daley's Landscape Awards Program. We took second place in 2006 in the commercial landscape citywide category.

Our winning look was far from Midwestern. Inspired by the tropics, contractor Moore Landscaping planted the park and terraced boxes along Franklin Street with a rich mix of giant majestic palms, oleander trees, hibiscus and cannas. Mother Nature helped by providing plenty of rain and moderate temperatures, which the thriving plants loved, according to Jim Davis of Moore Landscaping.

"We plan to do even better this year," he said. Since last winter, he and our building's general manager, Nancy Capadona, have been planning this year's look, which includes more oleander trees and shrubs in pale pink and hanging moss baskets full of exotic foliage and flowers. Among those plants will be chartreuse sweet potato vines, red-edged dracaenas, glossy crotons in brilliant yellow, orange and red, and new guinea impatiens in plum purple and cherry rose.
